We have several goals for the 2014-2015 school year; one of which is to better use technology to keep you informed of what is going on with PAT. Starting in mid-August, look for more frequent updates to our website. We will also be using email to share information such as event reminders and our newsletters, so please make sure that your parent educator has your current email address. If you do not have email available to you, please let your Parent Educator know so we can continue to send you a paper copy of the newsletter. We will be having two new parent educators join our program this fall, and two of our current parent educators will be switching roles slightly to work with our Title 1 preschool families. While every effort has been made to make this as transition as smooth as possible for all involved, some families may find that they have a different parent educator than last year. We have also used your feedback and suggestions to make some changes in the way we offer services to families. While we will continue to offer personal visits with a certified parent educator; group connection events for families to interact with each other; health, hearing, vision, and developmental screenings; a Drop in and Play center for parents and children to play together; and information about other local resources, how we do this may look

Many of you have asked for your parent educator to be able to meet with you more often, and Parents as Teachers National Center guidelines agree that visits should occur on a more frequent basis. We are pleased that we will be visiting with all families at least once a month throughout the school year so that we can better partner with you as parents to help you meet the goals you set for your family and your children. If this simply isn't possible in your schedule, please visit with your Parent Educator about the new PAT "Lite" program which includes all the components of Parents as Teachers (Group Connections, Drop in and Play, Screenings, and Resources) except for personal visits.

We have many families who are waiting to benefit from having a parent educator available to them for personal visits.

You also asked for more group connections, so we added several, using many of your suggestions as topics. See the calendar on pages 3-4 for details.

We have set additional screening events in order to be able to offer screenings to the families who are on the waiting list for PAT personal visits or who have chosen to be part of PAT Lite. If you have more than two children, or children who you feel would cooperate better if they were screened at our center, please also feel free to make an appointment at one of our screening events. Otherwise, please plan that we

will complete screenings in your home. Please note that all families are encouraged to come when Saving Sight is at our center; if you are coming only for their vision screening you do not need to make an appointment, but will be seen on a first-come first served basis.

We have changed up our Drop in and Play Center and added some new toys and materials (see photos above). DIP is open 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday when school is in session, and until 7 p.m. approximately one a month. See the event calendar for dates. DIP now also includes a resource center with information available to you about local service providers, events, and activities. Come check out our new look!

Looking at Literacy

Making reading together with young children (even before they are born) part of the daily routine has many benefits. Beyond simply enjoying books, it helps children want to learn to read, which in turn contributes to success in every subject in school.

Your parent educator can share information with you about what types of books and book behaviors are appropriate for each stage of development, and a book sharing activity is part of each personal visit.

Don't have a lot of books, or want to check out some new ones? A large

selection of children's books including board book can be found at the Missouri River Regional Library. The children's department upstairs also offers a play area, computer with children's games, and a variety of events including family movie nights and:

Laptime for ages 0-2: a special time for babies and their caregivers including music, movement, and socialization. Held the first and third Fridays of the month from 10:30-11 a.m.

Preschool Storytime for ages 3-5: Tuesdays from 10:30-11 a.m. Family Storytime for all ages: Wednesdays from 10:30-11:30. Barnes and Noble also has a free storytime for pre-K children, held Wednesdays and Saturdays from 10:30-11 a.m.

Looking to grow your own library? This year we are hosting a book exchange. If you have books your child has outgrown that you would like to share with someone else who would like them, you can give them to your parent educator or drop them off in our DIP center. Then help us celebrate Children's Book Week on May 5, and come choose some new-to-you books for your child. Thanks to Scholastic, we also give away books at our events.

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Ages and Stages: Games to Play

From Games to Play with Babies by Jackie Silberg (2011)

- **0-3 Months: Stroke the Baby--**This is a wonderful bonding game that encourages loving interaction between the baby and the adult. Find a variety of objects with which to stroke your baby. A blanket, feather, or cotton ball are all excellent choices. Hum softly as you stroke your baby. Rub baby's fingers and toes one at a time with each item.
- **3-6 Months: The Spider Game--** Lie on the floor with your baby, on your tummies, facing each other. Make your fingers crawl like a spider. Make them disappear and reappear. Wiggle your fingers. Crawl your fingers over your baby's hands or your baby's nose, then make them disappear. Always say, "Here comes the spider!"
- **6-9 Months:** Tug of War--Get on the floor with your baby. Give her one end of a long sock while you grasp the other end. Gently pull the sock toward you. Show the baby how to pull the end toward herself. Pretend the baby is so strong that she pulls you over.
- **9-12 Months: The Rainmaker--**Play this rainmaking game in the bathtub. Punch holes in a plastic bottle and give it to your baby. Show him how to fill the bottle with water and hold it in the air to make it rain. Your baby will be delighted with this activity. Sing "rain" songs such as "Rain, Rain, Go Away" and "It's Raining, It's Pouring."

From Games to Play with Toddlers by Jackie Silberg (2010)

- **12-15 Months: Changing Sounds--**This is a good game to develop your toddler's listening and language skills. Sit your child in your lap facing you. Start saying the same sound over and over. For example, "da, da, da." Now change the sound to something else like, "ga, ga, ga." If you notice a reaction when you change sounds, it shows that she is listening carefully. Go back to the first sound, and as you say it, change the pitch of your voice. When she seems to get bored with this, change to the second sound and change your voice pitch at the same time. If she responds with a smile or excitement, you know that she is listening intently. End the game with a big hug.
- 15-18 Months: Let's Roll--Your toddler is in a constant state of motion, crawling, climbing, walking, and running. Show your child how to roll. Lie down on the floor and roll from one end to the other. He will be delighted and will want to copy you. Play this game. Lie down on the floor side by side. Count to three. On the count of three, say in a big voice, "Let's roll!" Start rolling to the other side of the room. Be prepared to play this game often. Whenever you do an activity with your toddler, practice it on both right and left sides. Even though toddlers are too young to understand left and right, they can recognize that their bodies have two sides.
- **18-21 Months: Kitchen Band--**Get out pots, pans, plastic bowls, wooden spoons, metal spoons, and anything else that might make music. Sit on the floor with your toddler and start banging the spoons on the pots. Hit the pots together, the spoons together, and so on. Give a spoon and pot to your child and encourage her to copy you. Chant the following "Pots and pans are fun to play fun to play, fun to play. Pots and pans are fun to play, let's make music."
- **21-24 Months: Twos--**Toddlers are not ready yet to count or recognize numbers, but they can understand the basic concept of "two." Help your child begin to understand this concept by pointing out many things that come in pairs: two shoes, two socks, two hands, two feet, two ears. In your daily conversation, use the word "two" whenever possible. "Look at these two flowers." Give your toddler things in twos, "Here are two toys."

From Games to Play with Two-Year-Olds by Jackie Silberg (2010)

Young Twos: Building a Train--Collect two groups of blocks; one for you and one for your child. Invite your child to make a train with you. Put down one of your blocks and ask her to put down one of hers. Continue placing blocks next to one another. Talk about the train you are making together. Touch one block and say, "This is the block that you put down." Point to another block and say, "This is the block that I put down." Play a game with your child. Move the train of blocks and say, "Here comes the train. Choo, choo, choo." When children have an opportunity to play both roles, the leader and the follower, they begin to understand what working together means. Middle Twos: Games With Toys--Young children enjoy playing simple games such as "Ring Around the Rosy." Playing this game with a stuffed animal reinforces the rules of the game. Hold a favorite stuffed animal in your arms. Give your child another to hold in his arms. Sing the song "Ring Around the Rosy" and when you come to the "fall down" part, fall down. Now take it one step further. Sit on the floor and make the stuffed animal dance with your hands. When you come to the "fall down" part, let the toy fall to the ground. Two-year-olds love this game so much that they might play it without you. One of the many good things about this game is that your little one learns to wait for the words "fall down."

Older Twos: Funny Stuff--Two-year-olds are in the process of developing a sense of humor. They particularly enjoy calling something they recognize by a different name. Pick out a favorite book and read it with your child. Look at the pictures and point to a picture and call it by a different name. For example, point to a dog and call it a "cat." They will think it is pretty funny and want you to do another one. Naming animals and body parts by the wrong name is very, very funny to a two-year-old. Call a nose an "ear." Call a toe a "finger."
