What's going on in our classroom this week?

Reading/Writing: The theme for this week is "catching up" and "finishing up" considering the effects the weather has had on our school days. We will finish taking the iReady test this week. The final day to complete it is this Friday, although there may be an extension granted by the district. Students will strive to complete the rough drafts of their informational papers on Native Americans in order to finish typing and adding images with captions and a reference page. We will work on a few more nonfiction lessons about finding the main idea and supporting details, comparing and contrasting texts over a similar topic, and ways to summarize. Our class has also begun a new chapter read aloud in the Mark Twain Award nominee, *Wishtree* by Katherine Applegate.

Math: About 1/2 the class needs to finish the Unit 5 test over dividing decimals, so after we wrap up this & the iReady, we will start with a review of fraction vocabulary. Our new unit is over adding and subtracting fractions with unlike denominators. Our strategy will be to find the least common multiple (use it as the new denominator), then create equivalent fractions before solving the math problem.

Science: We will cover the earth's layers and vocabulary, such as: crust, mantle, core, continental drift, tectonic plates, and faults. <u>Be on the look out for some flash cards to help us study/</u>review the unit as we go.

Social Studies: This week we will cover a Scholastic News magazine and focus some on Martin Luther King, Jr. Next week our class begins its study of the settlement of Colonial America & discusses influences of early European immigrants on the shaping of our young country.
